"Fairs are like anything else," said Mayfield. "If you don't' keep up with the times and stay current, you'll be left behind."


Mayfield grew up showing hogs at fairs in southeastern Kansas. He climbed the leadership ladder as a state and national president of the FFA.

Professionally, Mayfield has lobbied in Washington and 13 states for agricultural issues and now shares his story of the importance of embracing change throughout the country. He also hosts the Commodity Classic, the biggest indoor agricultural show.

Mayfield and his wife split their time between Kansas City and Arizona, spending time with their two daughters and four grandchildren.

Contest Will Name Fairgrounds Coliseum

Contest entries are now being accepted by the Illinois Fairgrounds Foundation to rename the Coliseum on the Illinois State Fairgrounds in Springfield.

The contest runs through December 14. The winner will be selected by the Fair Foundation and the Illinois Department of Agriculture (IDOA) and announced in early January.

Current members of Illinois 4-H, FFA, and the Junior Horseman's Council are eligible to submit their naming ideas to the contest. Each member is allowed one entry and can submit it online at www.ilfairfoundation.com.

The winner will receive a silver platter of recognition and an Illinois State Fair Mega Pass. The winner could also be a guest of honor at the grand re-opening of the Coliseum and serve as a youth fair marshal during the 2019 Illinois State Fair.

"Agriculture is an integral part of our state's identity, and the Illinois State Fairgrounds play an important part in promoting our agriculture industry," said Governor Rauner. "Our youth in agriculture, including 4-H and FFA members, are the

future of this industry, so it's only right that we let them name the historic building that will be open for generations to come."

A generous donation of \$1 million from the Rauner Family Foundation, announced on Agriculture Day at the 2018 Illinois State Fair, has arrived at the Illinois Fairgrounds Foundation. This donation is specifically earmarked for repairs and updates to the historic Coliseum, which has been closed since it was declared unusable due to structural deficiencies.

The Foundation already made several improvements to the Fairgrounds ahead of the 2018 Illinois State Fair, including roof replacements and additional lighting and fans. In the Swine Barn, two 16-foot fans were installed above the show rings to help keep exhibitors, animals, and spectators cool, not just during the Illinois State Fair, but at other non-fair events that take place there throughout the year.

Lighting improvements were also made to the Livestock Center Show Ring, including the installation of 35 new LED bulbs, thanks to the George Obernagel Family Farm in

Monroe County. Their sponsorship of the Livestock Center will continue into July 2019, with improvements also slated to be made to the Center's audio system.

"The Department would like to thank the Illinois Fairgrounds Foundation, Governor Rauner, and all of those who have made donations to the Foundation," said Director of Agriculture Raymond Poe. "This Fairgrounds has so much history and holds fond memories for so many people – we want to make sure that continues for several more generations."

In addition, the Foundation recently purchased roofing materials for Barns 16A and 16B. This allowed state employees on the fairgrounds to reshingle both barns. These barns are located near the Coliseum and contain 22 horse stalls each. Previously unoccupied, they may now be used during the Illinois State Fair and during the many horse shows that take place on the Fairgrounds throughout the year.

Foster: Reports Due Dec. 31

Well another year is coming to an end. First I want to take a minute to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Years from all of us here at the department.

This time of year brings us with a couple things we are needing to wrap up for 2018.

Grand summary report was due in October 15th, Fairs & Expositions: Reports due December 31. All Fairs: Declarations of Intent are due December 31.

Those fairs that held horse racing in 2017 and 2018 can apply for \$1,000 in track improvement money. The applications need to be filed with the department before December 31. If you apply for and complete the track improvement before April 1, 2019. All receipts need to be submitted to the department before April 1, 2019. Please remember this money cannot be used in your rehab reimbursement for this year.

Everyone should have received their \$54,347.82, what a great way

to end the year. Remember this money is for normal operational needs and rehab.

All county fairs need to file a report and receipts with me by October 15th of each year until the money has been exhausted. If you have question, feel free to contact me.

Tim and I are looking forward to seeing you in January at the IAAF County Fair Convention.

ELECTION RESULTS

The Democrats now have super-majority once again in the House, which means they will not need any GOP votes to override the Governor's vetoes.

Once the Governor-Elect Pritzker's new administration takes over in January, there will mostly likely be whole turnover in the agency staff as far as directors, management and legislative liaisons, etc. The new Governor will be sworn in the second week in January.

There will be even more new faces in the General Assembly than originally anticipated because 9 incumbent legislators who planned to come back were defeated on election day, bringing the number of new legislators to well over 40.

This means it is more important than ever to constantly develop and maintain a working relationship with your legislators.

Every vote counts! Two races were so close that they had to wait two weeks for the mail in ballots to come in before the winner could be declared. On election night Sen. Mike Connelly (R-Naperville) was leading his democratic opponent Laura Ellman by only 12 votes but later ended up conceding after additional ballots came in.

Only 1 vote separated Rep. Helene Walsh (R-Mundelein) from Rep. Mary Edly-Allen, but Rep. Eddy-Allen pulled ahead by the time all the ballots were counted. If you don't think your vote counts, it does!

The extra \$54,347.82 payments for premium fairs are finally starting to be released by the Comptroller's Office. Please let me know when you receive yours

How can we spend it? This additional money can't be spent on prize money for agricultural competitions or purses, but CAN be used for any kind of operational expenses, rehab to the fair grounds, insurance, etc. There is NO TIME LIMIT (it can be spread out over years) for when the money can be spent but you just must include HOW it was spent in your annual October reports to the

Dept of Agriculture. If you use it for rehab, you can include it in your rehab receipts which you submit to the state every June and you will be reimbursed for a portion of it. To make it easier for record keeping, IAAF recommends that you keep this additional funding in a separate bank account.

The Queen Pageant and the Talent Contests have great participation. Seventy-one county fair queens will vie to be crowned Miss Illinois County Fair on Sunday evening. The events showcase some of Illinois’ finest young talent.

Kate Jennings in 4th Term Presidency

Kate Jennings is serving her fourth term as president of the Rock Island County Fair in East Moline.

She was recently a recipient of the Zone 5 Young Professionals Scholarship to attend the IAFE in San Antonio. Kate, 32, joined the fair board in 2011 and is now the first woman to ever serve as president of the board.

She attended IAFE with the goal of finding ideas to make her fair's 150th annual celebration in 2019 a huge success.

"I've learned so much about fairs since taking over as president," said Jennings. "In Rock Island, we have the unique opportunity to engage with a mainly urban audience. We try to bring in folks who have never seen a cow in person and teach them why agriculture is important in their everyday life."

This year's fair featured a cow birthing center that was extremely popular, says Jennings. "Even at 10:30 p.m., we had a barn full of

people wanting to see calves being born. We hope to expand that next year."

Her biggest challenge as president has been dealing with declining revenues — she took over with a deficit and now has brought the fair in the black by tweaking every aspect of the fair's finances.

"This year we stepped up our social media and reduced our TV and radio ads — not everyone thought that was a good idea, but it worked out," said Jennings.

Rather than have a big concert, the fair focuses on "wheels," said Jennings. "That's what our fairgoers like."

"There are so many ideas at IAFE — I came away with an idea to use our grounds for a drive-in movie night in the Grandstand," she said. "I'm going to go home and figure out how to implement it."
